



GREEKS BEARING GIFTS?

Readers of *Magdalene Matters* may be forgiven if they have been left feeling bothered and bewildered by recent debates and impending decisions concerning the so called “top-up fee” and its likely impact on University finances. They may be further forgiven for harbouring an impression - too often allowed to go unchallenged - that, however painful for individual students and their families, the top-up fee will at least solve the University’s and Colleges’ funding crises and put a welcome end to the need for College fundraising. RIP the Magdalene Campaign. Goodbye to all that.

On the contrary – though elements of the final package have yet to be determined (at both Government and University level) – it is already clear that the present proposals do not provide the hoped-for solution to the University’s funding problems and that they are most unlikely to do anything to improve the College’s finances.

3. This is a top-up *University* fee levied to address *University* needs and there is no requirement that *any* of the additional income should filter down to the Colleges. Since Magdalene currently receives £1,500 *less* per undergraduate per annum than it costs to provide for their education - a shortfall met wholly from the College’s own resources - this is not good news. Inevitably there will continue to be substantial and increasing claims on the Endowment which the new funding arrangement will do little, if anything, to ameliorate.

4. Significantly and - in its long-term implications more concerning still - any income derived from an increased University fee comes to the University not as “free-money”, but rather as a latter-day Trojan Horse. This takes the form of the Office of the Access Regulator whose powers include those of withdrawing funding from any institution which fails to toe whatever



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1. A conservative estimate of the *extra* income required to fund Cambridge *University* (as opposed to its constituent Colleges) puts the figure at something in the region of £24 million p.a. The present proposal will yield at most £20 million p.a. (gross).

2. A condition of the “new money” is that a large proportion of it must be “top-sliced” and set aside for student hardship in order to ensure that the higher University fee does not prevent those who cannot afford to pay it from coming to Cambridge. The College warmly supports this principle. However, the estimated £7.9 million p.a. which will be disbursed in this way is £7.9 million p.a. unavailable for other purposes. On this calculation, the University will gain only £12.1 million p.a. (or barely half) of the additional £24 million p.a. it requires to support its teaching and research.

admissions line Government - present and future - may care to impose.

For these reasons, the College remains unconvinced of the merits of a scheme which will not yield sufficient money to solve its financial problems, is unlikely to help in the recruitment and retention of junior and senior members and will erode yet further the College’s ability to make its own decisions free from political interference.

It is clear then that Magdalene’s future is in no way strengthened, let alone guaranteed, by the new funding arrangements and that its fate lies - as it always has - in our collective hands. So it’s goodbye to nothing: the Campaign goes on.

Quires of Angels

Over the last few years the College Choir has undergone a radical transformation of its fortunes under the direction first of the late Stephen Farmer



and, more recently, College Precentor Jonathan Hellyer Jones.

At the same time, the Choir has become an increasingly important ambassador for the College both at home and abroad. It has visited major cathedrals in Britain (including St Paul's and Westminster Abbey) and has toured to South Africa, Ireland and Malta. This summer it will be visiting Wales and is in the early stages of planning a visit to the USA in 2005.

Despite the inestimable advantage of the new College organ, the Choir's further development has been hampered by the indifferent quality of the musical editions from which it has been obliged

to perform. Happily, the process of replacing these outdated and unscholarly texts has now begun thanks to a generous benefaction from Philip Carne (1958) and his wife Chris. Hearing of the lamentable state (textually) of the Choir's *Lamentations*, they determined to help make a start, and significant elements of the choir's core (service) repertory have already been purchased. It is hoped to extend this process, and with it the richness of the Choir's repertoire, over the coming years as funds allow.

PEPYS BENEFACTION

The Pepys Library has received a welcome boost to its fortunes as a result of a generous benefaction from Lord Ezra (1936). An Honorary Fellow of the College and long-time member of the Association Committee, Derek has entertained a life-long interest in Pepys to which this gift gives welcome practical expression. As he told *Magdalene Matters*:

'I wanted to support the Pepys Library Fund, partly for personal reasons, because I have the same birthday as Pepys and we both went to "our College of Magdalene", but more importantly because I admire the Library, its contents and good order, and consider it should be more widely known and used.'



The Butler did it !

Honorary member Jack Vettriano (2003) has been much in the news recently. Featured in an edition of the *South Bank Show* in early March he was also Sue Lawley's guest on *Desert Island Discs* later in the same month.

More recently still, his most popular painting *The Singing Butler* sold for £744,800 at auction near Edinburgh on 19 April. A record for the artist, for any Scottish painter and for any painting sold in Scotland, the evidently strong interest at auction amply demonstrates the enormous popularity and appeal of an artist whose prints out-sell those of Van Gogh, Monet, Picasso and Warhol. *The Singing Butler* was originally sold for just over £4,500 in 1991.

Born in Scotland in 1951, Jack began painting full time only in 1988. His first

solo exhibition took place in London in 1992. He is represented by Tom Hewlett (1971) of the Portland Gallery, London.

Magdalene's Jack Vettriano Scholarship was established by Mr Vettriano to help encourage and support students from Scotland in financial hardship.
